Executive summary

MercyOne Clinton Medical Center and Genesis Medical Center (GMC), DeWitt, partnered together to complete a joint Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) for the service area, which includes 17 zip codes in five counties: Clinton, Jackson, Whiteside, Carroll and Scott. The CHNA was developed in collaboration with an advisory committee of community and public health partners. The CHNA was presented to and adopted by the MercyOne Clinton Medical Center Board of Directors on April 11th, 2024 and the Genesis Health System Board of Directors on May 2nd, 2024.

Ten significant health needs were identified based on the information gathered through a community survey, key informant interviews, community focus group, and secondary data review. Using a prioritization survey, members of MercyOne, Genesis, the advisory committee, and community members ranked each of the needs by severity, magnitude, and feasibility of change.

The significant community health needs, ranked order of priority, include:

1. Brain/Mental health
2. Substance use
3. Access to care
4. Cancer
5. Access to childcare
6. Food insecurity
7. Housing & homelessness
8. Obesity, obesity-associated disease, exercise
9. Access to dental care
10. Asthma
11. Teen pregnancy

MercyOne Medical Center Clinton and GMC DeWitt will reconvene in the spring and summer of 2024 to develop a multi-year strategy to address identified community health and social needs.

MercyOne Clinton Medical Center, a member of MercyOne, is a licensed 163-bed hospital with the ability to accommodate 107 patients. Services offered include emergency services offering level IV trauma support, radiation, oncology, pediatrics, birth center, perioperative services, inpatient behavioral health, inpatient rehabilitation (physical, occupational, speech), cardiac and pulmonary diagnostic and interventional services, sleep lab, laboratory, and pharmacy. Two miles from the main hospital campus is a MercyOne south health campus with outpatient rehabilitation, homecare and hospice, home medical equipment, and wound center.

Genesis Health System, its affiliates and partners, offer a continuum of health care services for a 17-county region of Eastern Iowa and Western Illinois. Genesis is one of the largest employers in the Quad Cities, with more than 5,000 employees.

GMC DeWitt, a member of Genesis Health System, is a 13-bed critical access hospital with cardiac rehabilitation, breast health, emergency services, gastroenterology, infusion, occupational therapy, ophthalmology, pain management, physician rehabilitation, radiology/imaging, respiratory care, sleep disorder study, and speech/ language pathology.

On March 1, 2023, Genesis joined MercyOne. MercyOne is a member of Trinity Health based in Livonia, Michigan.

MercyOne Clinton Medical Center and GMC DeWitt participate in clinically integrated networks (CIN) where providers work together to improve health, increase patient satisfaction, and lower health care costs for members and the communities served.

Summary and impact of previous needs assessments

MercyOne Clinton Medical Center and GMC, Dewitt completed the CHNA process independently last cycle.

MercyOne Clinton Medical Center

The MercyOne Clinton Medical Center Board approved the previous Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) on April 23, 2021. The significant health needs identified in the FY21 CHNA, in order of priority, include:

1. Mental health
2. Substance abuse
3. Access to health care
4. Obesity
5. Poverty
6. Access to food
7. Suicide
8. Cancer

A wide range of priority health and social issues emerged from the CHNA process. MercyOne Clinton Medical Center determined that it could effectively focus on only those needs which were most pressing, under- addressed and within its ability to influence. MercyOne Clinton Medical Center, in collaboration with community partners, chose to focus on initiatives addressing the following needs:

1. Mental health
2. Substance abuse
3. Access to health Care

The below section highlights actions taken over the succeeding three years to address selected needs as well as the impact of those actions:

Mental health

MercyOne Clinton Medical Center was involved in the following projects during fiscal years 2022- 2024 to improve brain health in the community:

Mobile medical unit: MercyOne’s mobile medical unit, operating out of Dubuque, performed 46 brain health screenings to vulnerable community members at the city of Clinton’s food pantries, community resource centers and events, and homeless shelters in FY22 and FY23.

Telepsychiatry program: MercyOne Clinton subsidized its tele-psych program to provide access to mental health inpatient care and treatment without people needing to leave the community.

Community resource directory: In FY23, all inpatients discharged from the behavioral health unit were given resources for outpatient support and are scheduled for follow-up care prior to their discharge so that the patient knows when and where they can follow-up. Findhelp.org, a community resource directory, was used to connect patients with community resources to ensure they have basic needs for physical and mental health stability. If a patient declined outpatient services, MercyOne Clinton connected the patient with local community agencies who could support their mental health needs. Patients participated in group activities, including self-care activities, disease process education, life skills, coping strategies, and/or safety planning.

Substance abuse

MercyOne Clinton Medical Center was involved in the following projects during fiscal years 2022- 2024 to improve substance abuse in our community:

Medicated assisted treatment: MercyOne Clinton collaborated with the City of Clinton to operate a Medicated Assisted Treatment (MAT) Clinic. The clinic was funded by a Comprehensive Opioid Abuse Program (COAP) grant that was received by the City of Clinton. In FY23 MercyOne Clinton had 277 patient encounters at the MAT clinic for Opioid Use Disorder. Towards the end of FY23, the MAT clinic expanded its services to include administering Vivitrol for alcohol use disorder.

Coalitions: MercyOne Clinton served on a number of community groups addressing substance abuse including the Gateway ImpACT Coalition (anti-drug), CRUSH+ (Community Resources United to Stop Heroin), Breathe Easy (tobacco coalition), and Clinton Collaborative Council (focused on Strategic Initiatives to Prevent Drug Overdoses)

Access to Care

MercyOne Clinton Medical Center was involved in the following projects during fiscal years 2022- 2024 to increase access to care in our community:

Physician recruitment: Due to the primary and specialty care need in our service area, MercyOne Clinton hired a physician recruitment agency to help with recruiting health care providers to our service area.

Mobile medical unit: MercyOne’s mobile medical unit, operating out of Dubuque, made 12 trips to Clinton, 10 of which specifically targeted vulnerable populations. Vulnerable population outreach events included visits to food pantries, community resource centers and events, and homeless shelters. At these events, health screenings (blood pressure, blood sugar, brain health), vaccines, and connections to other needed resources were offered free of charge.

Transportation: Transportation was identified as a barrier to accessing health care. To assist vulnerable patients to get to and from health care, MercyOne Clinton offered a transportation program for qualifying or uninsured patients. In FY23, paratransit was provided for patients in the emergency department, renal dialysis, cardiac rehab, behavioral medical unit, outpatient nutrition education and people in the community seeking health education programs. In FY23, 50 patients were given paratransit passes. Approximately 200 regular, fixed-route bus passes were also given.

Diabetes prevention program: MercyOne Clinton had two lifestyle coaches facilitate Prevent T2 classes, a Centers for Disease Control recognized Diabetes Prevention Program (DPP). The Prevent T2 program was offered for free in order to increase access to preventative care. In FY23, MercyOne Clinton worked with 24 participants.

Medicaid enrollment assistance: MercyOne Clinton contracted First Source to assist patients with no insurance to explore and apply for insurance to improve their access to health care. MercyOne financial counselors also spent time assisting patients in enrolling in Medicaid and public programs outside of their regular financial assistance duties.

Genesis Medical Center DeWitt

The Genesis Health System Board approved the previous Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) in 2021 and revised and readopted on June 1, 2023. The significant health needs identified in the FY21 CHNA, in order of priority, include:

1. Substance abuse
2. Mental illness
3. Diabetes and Access to health care
4. Infant Health

A wide range of priority health and social issues emerged from the CHNA process. GMC DeWitt determined that it could effectively focus on only those needs which were most pressing, under-addressed and within its ability to influence. GMC DeWitt, in collaboration with community partners, chose to focus on initiatives addressing the following needs:

1. Healthy Behaviors
2. Decrease in Youth Risky Behaviors
3. Mental Health Awareness and Services

Healthy Behaviors

GMC DeWitt was involved in the following projects during fiscal years 2022- 2024 to improve healthy behaviors in our community: integrates health, wellness activities, smoking cessation, physical activity, and weight status.

Switch program: This School Wellness Integration Target Child Health (SWITCH) Program is a school wellness initiative that targets wellness programming, which encourages 60 minutes of physical activity a day, less than two hours of screen time a day, and five servings of fruits and vegetables a day. This program was completed for DeWitt area families by the extension office.

Healthy eating habits: School nurses in DeWitt schools were provided with health eating habits posters for educational purposes.

Decrease in Youth Risky Behaviors

GMC DeWitt was involved in the following projects during fiscal years 2022- 2024 to decrease youth risky

behaviors in our community: teenage pregnancy, marijuana and tobacco use.

DeWitt/Camanche Coalition: This coalition and the Smoke Free Initiative were attended by GMC DeWitt staff and focus on reducing substance abuse and tobacco use among youths. Initiatives include education and outreach to local organizations, education presentation to Clinton and DeWitt schools and worksites, and promoting Quitline.

Safe medication disposal: Scott Drug Pharmacy, now under Genesis Health System, provides a drop box for safe unused medication disposal.

Mental Health Awareness and Services

GMC DeWitt was involved in the following projects during fiscal years 2022- 2024 to improve mental health awareness and services in our community: suicide prevention and awareness, medication disposal, education on adverse childhood experience (ACE).

Connections Matter: This organization promotes connections as the foundation for developing health brains. They provide trainings on developing connections in social circles and in the workplace. GMC DeWitt nurses became educated trainers and provided education to the Medical/Surgical and ED units at GMC DeWitt and DeWitt Lion's Club. Further education was provided to the Visiting Nurse Association (VNA) staff and hosted at GMC DeWitt.

Respite House: The GMC DeWitt Foundation and Genesis Health System Foundation provided support to the DeWitt respite house through a lease agreement with GMC DeWitt.

Telepsych services: Using an Eastern Iowa grant, GMC DeWitt continued provided contracted telepsych services within the ED and RN Care Coordination for mental health services from ED nurses and our community RN care coordinator.

Concussion management: Assisted with building concussion management into DeWitt public school's initial assessment for any student athlete. GMC DeWitt also provided coverage for treatment at athletic events for Northeast, DeWitt, and Calamus/Wheatland schools.

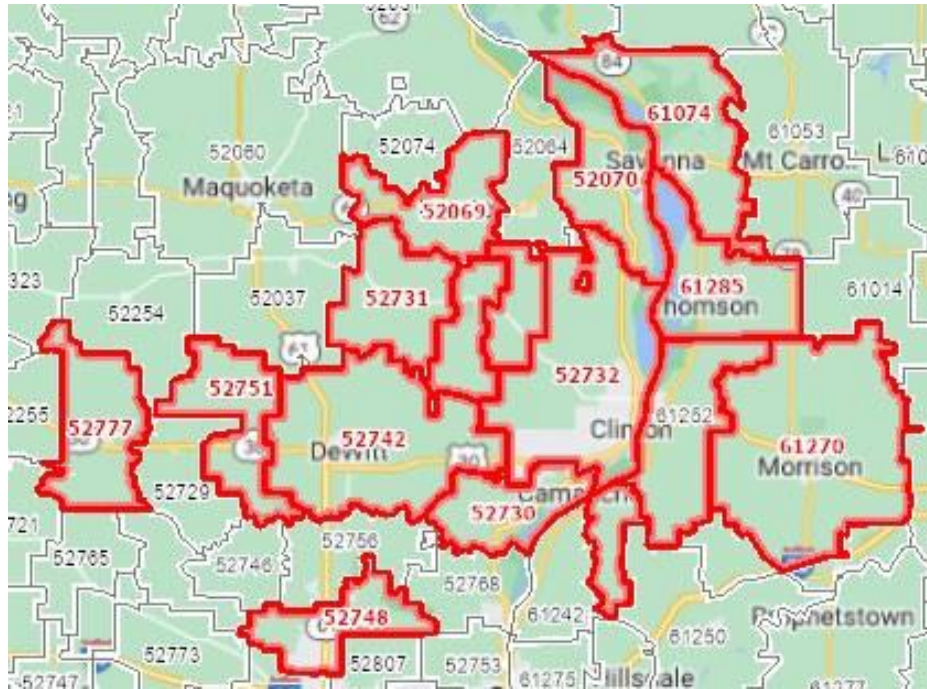
Written comments

Community description

Geographic area

The geographic area for this assessment includes 17 zip codes in five (5) counties in Iowa and Illinois. The five counties include Clinton, Jackson, and Scott in Iowa, and Whiteside and Carroll in Illinois. 93% of MercyOne Clinton Medical Center patients reside within this area and 79% of GHC Dewitt patients reside within this area. This service area does not exclude low-income or underserved populations.

Population characteristics

The total population of the service area, as recorded on the most recent census in 2023, is 76,099, and is trending downward. The population is primarily rural with two small cities, Clinton and DeWitt. The median age is 42.5, which is higher than the median Iowa and US age of 38. The population is mostly Caucasian, with 92.3% White, 2.6% Black, 0.05% Native American, 0.6% Asian, and 4.3% Hispanic.

Assessment process

Community assessment occurred through secondary data pulled from state and national databases, key informant interviews, input from an advisory community made of community residents, a community survey, focus group, and a second survey for needs prioritization. This process began in early 2023 by analyzing the previous CNHAs from DeWitt and Clinton and analyzing data from several state and national databases. This review allowed a baseline understanding of the region's demographics and historical needs. We then conducted key informant interviews throughout 2023 and into 2024 to understand the strengths and needs of the community from the perspective of residents. Between September and October 2023, sweeping community input was collected through a community survey, distributed throughout Clinton, DeWitt, and the surrounding and rural regions. Following the survey, a focus group on December 20, 2023 gathered insights from underserved residents who were experiencing many of the needs identified from the survey. The focus group's purpose was the further understand the root causes of many of the identified needs. In January 2024, the advisory committee, community residents, and Genesis and Clinton Hospital leaders prioritized a list of the ten greatest needs in the community.

Key informant interviews

Community input began in early 2023 through several key informant interviews to understand the strengths and needs from the perspective of residents.

Community survey

Broader community input was collected community through a 19-question survey in the fall of 2023. A total of 124 responses were collected between September and October 2023. Surveys were distributed to community members and organizations throughout the service area, including, but not limited to, MercyOne Clinton Medical Center, GMC Dewitt, Community Health Care (CHC), Area Substance Abuse Council (ASAC), the Clinton Resource Center, Speak Out Against Suicide, and the Clinton public transit system. Requests to complete the online survey were posted on social media as well as in physical locations. A copy of the survey is included in the Appendix.

Community focus group

A focus group was held on December 20, 2023 in an effort to collect input from people who may be experiencing poverty. The focus group was held at Information, Referral, and Assistance Services in Clinton, IA. The organization's Mission is to link people in need with appropriate services, to identify and respond to unmet community needs, and to provide emergency assistance to people who fall through the cracks in the human service network. All focus group participants were from priority zip codes and part of the service area.

Need	Description
Access to Care	35.5% have not been able to receive all the care they need (46.7% in Clinton). Challenges in accessing primary care due to appointment availability (32.3%) and hours of operation (27.4%)
Brain/Mental Health	46% faced challenges in receiving care, including appointment availability (14.5%) and cost (10.5%). 45.2% said brain health is a concern for adults and 54.8% said it is a concern for children (62.1% in DeWitt).
Obesity/ Heart Disease	Listed as top three concern in all zip codes. 40% self-reported to be obese, 35.5% self-reported to have heart problems (50% and 37.1% in Clinton respectively). In DeWitt, 41.1% of surveys listed obesity as a concern, more than other counties.
Diet/Exercise	8.1% had trouble accessing exercise opportunities (13.8% in DeWitt).
Medical Judgement/ Discrimination	16.9% of respondents felt judged by health care providers (24.1% in DeWitt). Most common judgement was on physical appearance.

Significant community health needs

Percent differences between the service area and Iowa and the nation were calculated in order to quantify the magnitude of differences for each data indicator. Data indicators were then color-coded by magnitude of disparity between the service area values and the benchmark values to identify health and social issues areas are of the greatest need for improvement. Data from the community via survey and themes from the focus group and informant interviews were then combined with the secondary data. After careful consideration by the advisory committee, ten significant community health needs emerged. The table below summarizes the data supporting each of the ten significant needs.

Prioritized needs

The above chart outlining the data for each significant health need was shared with leaders from each hospital as well as community leaders*. These leaders were asked to rate the magnitude, severity, and feasibility of each need on a scale of one to five based the data presented and their personal experiences working in the community. Fifty-three (53) community leaders responded, and the results were tabulated giving equal weight to severity, magnitude, and feasibility. According to this survey, the significant community health needs, ranked order of priority, include:

1. Brain/Mental health
2. Substance use
3. Access to care
4. Cancer
5. Access to childcare
6. Food insecurity
7. Housing & homelessness
8. Obesity, obesity-associated disease, exercise
9. Access to dental care
10. Asthma
11. Teen pregnancy*

*Note: Teen pregnancy was identified after prioritization survey as a significant need due to overwhelming disparity in service area rates compared to state and national rates and was therefore not able to be ranked.
